COURSE OBJECTIVES:

The course is designed to understand the formation, management and functions of the Companies. The Course discusses the relevance of corporate personality, different kinds of companies and their registration requirement. The course also discusses in detail the modes of capital for the companies and their liabilities. Therefore, the course needs to be taught in light of the new Companies Amendment Act 2013 and other latest amendments. This course endeavors to develop students with the learning outcomes such as to acquaint the students with different business entities; to have complete knowledge of formation & working of companies; to understand different kinds of capital and understand the raising of the same; to comprehend the protection of minority shareholders and to understand the winding up under Companies Act, 2013 and Liquidation under IBC, 2016.
