**Subject Code: 602**

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

The main objective of the Course is to develop advanced understanding of methodology and practice of Doctrines, Privileges and Powers in the Indian Constitution. Within this general objective student will learn about the theoretical foundation of Administrative Law(s), their normative ordering and how they have been incorporated in the Indian Constitution. The Course will present an evolution of judicial review by the Supreme Court of India. The Course will explore the tension between powers of legislation and judiciary and how it is resolved by the Judiciary particularly through development and application of judicial doctrines of proportionality and margin of appreciation. The Course will also present an evaluation of rule of law in different democracies, how they are crystallized and codified by the founding treaties and secondary legislation by way of comparative study.

And the other main objective of the Course is to develop advanced understanding on the concept of emergency. The Course emphasizes on current trends of cooperation and coordination rather than demarcation of powers between different levels of government.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

It also highlights the various rights available to the workmen employed in industries and the remedies for its misuse by the employer. The course is not designed to equip students to practice labour law; nor is prior legal knowledge required or expected. It is, however, intended to help the students to acquire a good historical, theoretical and practical working knowledge of the Indian legal system pertaining to labour relations. At the end of the course, the student will be in a position to identify all the related aspects of labour law that are practices in India and also demonstrate an intellectual capacity for solving industrial disputes.
